Parish Council Chairman's Report

In this Spring edition of your Parish Newsletter, which is the second of 2019, it is customary to state the roles of the Councillors for the coming year. With deadlines for submissions to the Newsletter brought forward these will now be in the late summer/early Autumn edition.

A year on from my Spring 2018 edition I am staggered to state that our weather remains on track to repeat the 1975 -1976 pattern. As most of you know I often provide parameters of our recent weather with comparisons stretching back to 1910. Coming out of a dry Autumn and now with only 101mm of rainfall so far this year compares to 84mm in the first 4 months of 1976. At home we have started re-cycling any washing water (with very little detergent) to water sensitive and young plants. It is amazing the number of gallons that day to day cleaning can amount to.

Electoral Representations

St Edmundsbury and Forest Heath councils have now gone after more than 40 years, making way for the new West Suffolk Council. This new authority will now have only 64 seats, down from 72, which will deliver electoral fairness for voters as well as reflecting community ties throughout West Suffolk. To ensure equal representation from Councillors it was necessary to combine The Fornhams (Fornham St Martin, Fornham St Genevieve and Fornham All Saints) with Great Barton.

Great Barton Parish which includes the "Severals" development remains with 11 Councillors and following an electoral review in 2017 has been divide into 2 wards. The north ward will represent the current electorate and has been designated 9 Councillors. The south ward will be the new housing development (Severals) and currently has 2 Councillors allocated. The ratio of Councillors between wards will change as the new development progresses to ensure there is equal representations from each ward.

As there are no homes in the Severals development Great Barton will have a maximum of 9 Councillors. The May Parish Council meeting will see the election of officers for the coming year and which Councillors will be serving on the numerous sub-committees; finance, planning, transport, Icepits Wood, Neighbourhood Plan, youth and village hall representatives.

I very much regret to inform you that Mrs Nicola Crouch has decided not to stand as a Parish Councillor for 2019/2020 due to many other commitments. On your behalf I sincerely thank Nicola for her contributions to the Parish over the last 3 years. However, I am delighted Nicola will remain on the Neighbourhood Plan Working Group and see your Plan through to fruition.

West Suffolk Operational Hub (WSOH):

Now into the second year of construction of the West Suffolk Operational Hub the joint discussions between the three developers (SEBC and FHDC (now West Suffolk Council), and SCC) and the Community Liaison Group of The Fornhams and Great Barton is towards the final phases of construction (second fix and internal road surfacing).

Since March 11th the main electric feed cable has been installed passing under Fornham Road and coinciding with widening of this road. This will provide a central lane to facilitate turning into the House Waste Re-cycling Centre (HWRC) and the commercial entrance so as not to impede east bound traffic to Great Barton from the A134/Barton Hill area. This is a 12-week programme and the last 3-4 days will see Fornham Road closed to motorised traffic to facilitate final tarmac surfacing.

The liaison discussions have indicated a phased opening to the facilities, hopefully to effect a seamless change for operations transferred from other areas and for users of the facilities. An area that has had limited discussion is the opening days of the week for the HWRC.. The single discipline site currently at Rougham Hill which accepts our household waste will move to the Fornham Road site, and as other waste agencies will be working 7 days a week at the Hub the Parish Councils of The Fornhams and Great Barton would like to see the HWRC open 7 days a week especially as there will be a re-sale shop. The Parishes see this as a positive move to providing a useful service to taxpayers and would minimise fly tipping in the immediate vicinity by opening 7 days a week.

Hall Park

May I congratulate the many residents in and around Hall Park who have tackled the understory surrounding the woodland areas to provide a much more pleasing landscape than an array of nettles thistles and brambles and to allow easy access to the two copses.

Neighbourhood Plan Update -

As I reported in the last Newsletter the compilation of a draft Neighbourhood Plan is going through some final stages before it is debated with the whole Neighbourhood Plan Working Group level and with the Parish Council. An important area that is receiving attendance is the General Design and Character of the village which will cover the following:

- Settlement Pattern and layout including Open spaces
- Building Type, Scale (heights and roofline) and Forms including car parking
- Building Materials
- Architectural Details

Once these policies have been through the Neighbourhood Working Group, (no doubt to ensure they reflect the wishes from earlier consultations) they will then be available for consultation.

The Spring Litter Clean of the Village on Saturday 27th April Compared to the weather at Easter, last weekend for the litter pick was decidedly chilly. However, despite the single figure temperature and blustery conditions, the outpouring of help was excellent with the vast majority of roadside verges cleansed of anything you can imagine. There were around 30 bags of rubbish collected, and some larger items, and I would estimate around ½ tonne of rubbish/waste.

Icepits Wood

Following two independent arboricultural reviews of the trees in Icepits wood and further opinions from The Forestry Commission, there will be safety maintenance work in the coming week along the public footpath and the eastern boundary. A fortnight later in the middle of May, maintenance work will be carried out alongside the A143 where there will be the requirement for traffic management.

There are two aspects around Great Barton that have come to my attention and have been mentioned on numerous occasions:

Could dog lovers who kindly pick up and wrap the excrement in a poly bag please take it home and place in the black refuse bin. I am dumbfounded to understand why poly bags with dog poo are then abandoned on the roadside or can be seen in the hedgerow.

The next topic is vehicles parking on pavements. Pavements are specifically in place to segregate foot traffic away from motorised vehicles, and too often you can see elderly people and young parents/ grandparents with pushchairs having to navigate into the carriageway because a motorist has parked on the pavement. All too often the extra space gained on the carriageway cannot be utilised as two-way traffic cannot pass each other with a vehicle partially parked on the pavement and therefore oncoming vehicles have to give way to each other. Please think hard about pedestrian safety and avoid blocking any part of the pavement. This situation is exacerbated further as Suffolk Highways do not deem keeping footpaths fully clear of vegetation as a priority. I refer specifically to the pavement on the northside of the A143 as Suffolk Highways hierarchy of maintenance works sees this of low priority.

Let's make Great Barton an even more pretty and safer place to live.

VILLAGE HALL UPDATE

Winter appears to be well and truly over and I'm sure we are all looking forward to a lovely summer. The first event on the Village Hall calendar is our first Car Boot Sale of the season which is on **Sunday 9**th **June 10.00 am – 1.00 pm.**

The Village Hall Management Committee is always hopeful that the Car Boot Sales are well attended and enjoyable. The charges which come to the Village Hall come solely from the rental charges for the pitches or tables and the Refreshments. This income is important in that there are many maintenance jobs – such as cleaning, etc – which are vital in keeping the Village Hall in a good state for our clients. Those who arrange the parking on the Fields, those who are responsible for the delicious smell coming from the kitchen and those who set up tables and chairs are all volunteers. It is thanks to these people that the running costs of the Car Boot Sales are kept to a minimum. So, please support the Village Hall Car Boot Sales.

One of our frequent problems concerns the Playing Fields and – here you might guess – the problem is solely down to dog walkers who are not prepared to take proper care of their dogs. A few years ago one of the grass maintenance men had to return to base to wash and change his clothing as he had been sprayed by you-knowwhat. Please, please clear up after your dog.

As you are no doubt aware I have not been so able to get out and about around Great Barton as much on account of health issues. It is good to have visitors and supporters who drop by for a chat and also help out with sorting through mountains of bric a brac, clothes, books etc for sale within the shop (which is not open as often as I would wish) or for onward transmission to other outlets. My thanks to you all. My "Money-man" with the assistance of other folk has also undertaken the mammoth task of processing the 100 or so collection boxes which you are filling so generously. He has been doing a "sterling job" no pun intended.

Talking of the finances the Shop Sales stand at around £150 excluding the sales of clothes etc where the funds go direct to HQ. These yield around £25 per fortnight. The house boxes total is circa £1900. There is still a small amount to be accounted for. A School Christingle Collection yielded £42 and an Autumnal Birthday Charity Collection yielded £195. Sundry sales of coin/old notes etc has yielded £95 so far. Foreign notes and coin are always welcome either direct or in the boxes. There have also been some sundry donations with the Christmas cards I received. My thanks to you all.

My Health, Our Future



Our report about children and young people's mental health & emotional wellbeing in Suffolk

Healthwatch Suffolk - Thurston Community College

Thurston Community College's children will potentially benefit from changes in how their mental health and emotional wellbeing is supported, after taking part in a county-wide report focusing on the challenges young people face in and out of school.

Healthwatch Suffolk's "My Health, Our Future" project highlights troubling statistics surrounding body image, self-harm, exam stress, cyberbullying, and social media use, including the shocking revelation that a quarter of female students aged 16 say they have self-harmed.

Released this month, the full report, which over two years has gathered almost 14,000 responses from people aged 11 to 19, can be downloaded directly from the Healthwatch Suffolk website at www.healthwatchsuffolk.co.uk

With every participating school having received a tailored report detailing their student's responses, it is hoped that the findings will continue to drive vital changes in curriculum and policy.

Now to what has been happening with all the "Scouts" young and older, the Beavers have had the annual sleep over, run by the District, the Cubs have been exploring the Icepit Woods as well as one of the Scout Troops, there has been a number of Chief Scout Wards, which I was very happy to present, as you know a mile stone in each section but getting harder as they

grow in age.



Calthorpe & Edwards Educational Foundation

This Foundation has existed for over 250 years to help young people under the age of 25 with study materials and books required for Further Education. In effect, this means any course which is NOT offered at Upper School/Community College. This includes NVQs which are not offered in schools.

The grant, which is usually limited to a maximum of 3 years, may be extended, at the discretion of the Trustees, by one year but to no person over the age of 25. To qualify the applicants must reside in one of 13 parishes:

Category A (known as the five Inner Parishes) includes Ampton, Ingham, Great & Little Livermere and Timworth.

Category B (known as the eight Outer Parishes) includes Culford, Fornham St. Genevieve, Fornham St. Martin, **Great Barton**, Ixworth, Troston, West Stow and Wordwell.

Should there be a waiting list, preference will be given to those from Category A. At present the annual grant, paid in three equal instalments, is:

± £300 per annum

However this amount may vary from year to year dependent on the number of applicants.


