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JUBILEE TORCH RELAY in Suffolk in May 2022

he Festival of Suffolk is holding a Torch Relay, carried on its journey in May by selected community torch bearers riding on a rickshaw. The symbolic torch will tour the county from Friday 13th May 2022 to Wednesday 1st June 2022 to herald the start of the Festival of Suffolk and the celebrations to mark HM the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

Suggested local heroes will be nominated by their community and it is hoped that all the towns and villages take the opportunity to celebrate and welcome the torch as it transits through their community. The torch begins its journey on the county boundary at Brandon and then passes through 250 towns and villages, a distance of over 550 miles before reaching its final destination at the Suffolk Show in Ipswich.

Communities across Suffolk are invited to nominate worthy individuals to carry the torch. These could include local heroes or notable characters, chosen in recognition for their service to the community. Torch bearers will sit in the rickshaw and so it is suitable for all ages and all abilities. Suggestions should be made to parish councils or via www.festivalofsuffolk.org.

A small team comprising of the rickshaw driver and a support vehicle will escort the torch throughout its journey. The team will keep the torch on schedule and ensure the safe passage of the torch. Led by the Bury St Edmunds rickshaw team, the rickshaws of Framlingham and Stowmarket will

The torch has great symbolism for the Queen, with 70 light holes, and a shiny surface to reflect the platinum anniversary.





Great Events of the Royal year 1953. Many books were published


We loved the street party and had special food .

Food ideas for the picnic

Coronation Chicken was created by "Le Cordon Bleu" for the Coronation Banquet. In 1953 serving Coronation chicken curry to such a large number of people, would have been an enormous challenge but it was actually a huge success!

Many of the ingredients had only just become available in 1953, due to post-war rationing. The recipe was originally made up of young roasting chickens, water and wine, cooked with carrots, a bouquet garni, salt, peppercorns and a creamy curry sauce.

There are plenty of recipes on the Internet which you could make for The Big Picnic

A few examples:

- Mini pork pies with piccalilli
- Fruity Flag Traybake
- Bunting Biscuits (one for children to make?)
- Homemade pink lemonade
- Bacon and egg pies

Coronation chicken buns recipe (cordonbleu.edu)

Coronation Chicken Buns

Serves 2

Preparation time: 20 minutes
Cooking time: 8 minutes
Total time: 28 minutes

Ingredients

1 hot-smoked chicken breast

2 spring onions, finely sliced

2 g mild curry powder

2 g ground turmeric

60 g mayonnaise

15 g crème fraiche

5 g tomato ketchup

15 g apricot nappage (sieved jam)

juice of 1 lime

small bunch coriander leaves

2 brioche buns salt and pepper

Method

Finely dice the chicken breast and finely slice the spring onions, then place in a large bowl.

Sprinkle over the curry powder and ground turmeric. Add the mayonnaise, crème fraîche, tomato ketchup, curry powder, apricot jam and lime juice and stir to combine. Season with salt and pepper.

Roughly chop the coriander leaves. Add to the chicken mixture and stir to coat in the sauce.

Slice the brioche buns lengthwise and set the tops aside. Scoop out the inside, being careful not to break the bun crust. Fill the scooped hole with the chicken mixture and top with a little mangetout, coconut chips and coriander leaves. Put the top on the bun and serve immediately.



Bringing local news to the blind and partially sighted

For over 40 years, St Edmundsbury Newstalk, a registered charity, has been producing a weekly recording for registered blind and partially sighted people.

The recordings are produced on digital audio files saved on USB memory sticks for use on special players supplied by Newstalk. News, readers' letters and feature items are selected from local newspapers.

We have a team of volunteers, each having their own role in the

production process to ensure that the

recordings are dispatched on time. The service is run entirely by unpaid volunteers. The recordings are delivered and returned by Royal Mail free of charge. Nevertheless, the service does have quite high running costs: studio rent, recording equipment, maintenance of equipment, USB players, USB memory sticks and postal pouches. We receive no direct financial support and rely on donations to maintain the service.

Any blind or partially sighted person can receive our recordings and the service is completely free of charge.

Help support and rebuild your NHS – call out for NHS reservists.

A call out is being made for former health and care staff across Suffolk and North East Essex to register their interest in becoming an NHS reservist.

There are a wide range of opportunities available, including assisting people who are being discharged from hospital or as part of the ongoing NHS COVID-19 vaccination programme.

Anyone who has previously worked in health and care is encouraged to register, with interest sought from all former staff members such as administrators, care assistants, GPs, nurses, physiotherapists, paramedics and pharmacists.

Those interested may have retired from their roles or still be working but in a different sector.

Full training will be provided, and NHS reservists will be paid in line with the role they are doing. Support will also be given by existing full-time staff that they can 'buddy up' with before starting any role. Although time commitment will vary it is anticipated to be around 30 days each year.

Local hospitals and NHS services can then call on the 'NHS reservist community' depending on their staffing requirements and pressures in their area, creating a bank of extra resources for when it is needed.

Following this initial call-out for former health and care staff, it is anticipated that in the coming months people from all backgrounds and experiences will be asked to register their interest.

Amanda Lyes, Director of Workforce for the Suffolk and North East Essex Integrated Care System, said: "Over the past two years of the pandemic former health care workers and volunteers have played an invaluable role in ensuring our local vaccination programme has been one of the very best in the country.

"As our NHS starts to rebuild itself, both locally and nationally, there's now a need for NHS reservists to support that recovery.

"We ask people to help their local NHS regain the ground lost during the pandemic, hand help to tackle the backlog and support the continued delivery of the vaccination programme."

The Hedgehogs of Great Barton are 'Stirring'

Not all hedgehogs hibernate and for those that are only now just emerging from their



hibernaculum, it's an important time. They emerge skinnier, somewhat dehydrated and in urgent need of food and water.

Hedgehogs are omnivores and although their preferred foods are beetles and caterpillars, they will also eat slugs, snails and worms. Sadly, the last three are intermediate hosts to the parasites (lungworm & roundworms) and can lead to their demise.

To support the hedgehogs, please leave them low sided, sturdy bowls containing fresh water and cat and/or kitten biscuits. If you want to, you can leave meat based, jelly or loaf variety cat or dog meat but do remove left overs early in the day as flies will, otherwise, lay eggs on it. (Never feed, bread, milk, mealworms, calci worms, seeds or peanuts.

Major medical issues can result if so). You really don't need to buy fancy 'hedgehog' foods.

Hedgehogs will be mating soon and you'll likely hear noises at night. There will also be some territorial disputes.

Hedgehogs have a gestation of about 30 days and can produce a litter of up to 7 hoglets. They remain with their litter for about 6 weeks, occasionally coming out for food and water at night and during the day.

If a hedgehog is acting 'purposefully' in daylight, leave it well alone.

However, if it is out in daylight uncurled or semi curved, wobbly, unwell, hurt or with flies around it, secure it (wearing gloves) and call a hedgehog rescue asap. Don't delay. Enjoy your visitors because they are currently in serious decline and classified as endangered.

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


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
